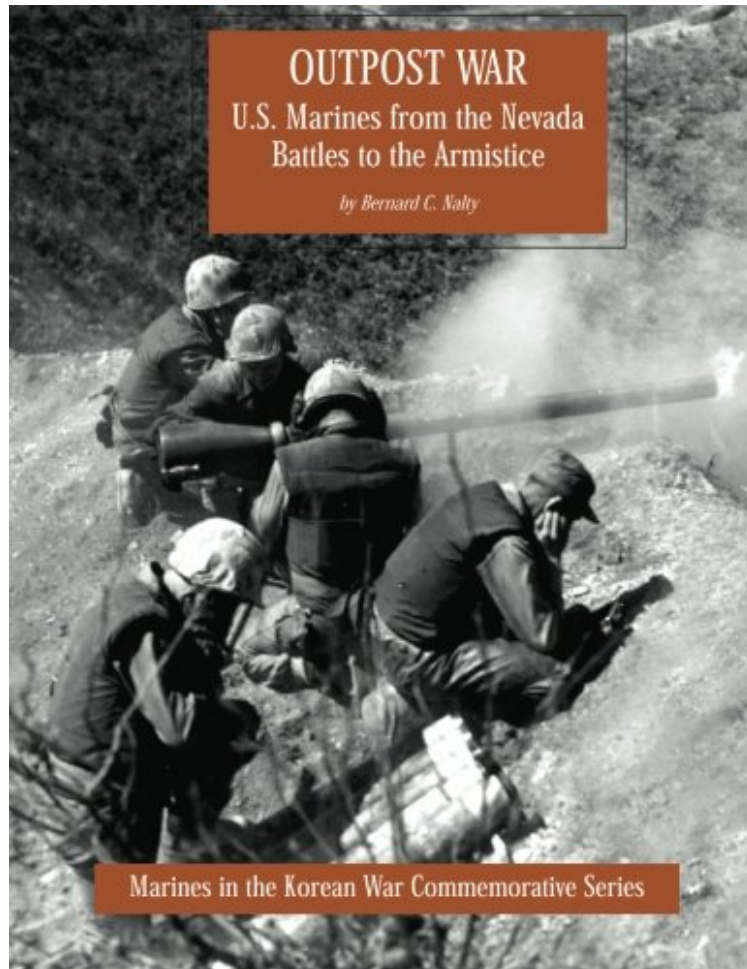

About the AuthorBernard C. Nalty, a member of the Marine Corps historical program from October 1956 to September 1961, collaborated with Henry I. Shaw, Jr., and Edwin T. Turnbladh on Central Pacific Drive, a volume of the History of U. S. Marine Corps Operations in World War II. He also completed more than 14 short historical studies, some of which appeared in Leatherneck magazine or the Marine Corps Gazette. He joined the history office of the Joint Chiefs of Staff in 1961, transferred in 1964 to the Air Force history program, and retired in 1994. Mr. Nalty has written or edited a number of publications, including Blacks in the Military: Essential Documents, Strength for the Fight: A History of Black Americans in the Military, The Vietnam War, Tigers Over Asia, Air Power and the Fight for Khe Sanh, and Winged Shield, Winged Sword: A History of the U.S. Air Force. In addition to contributing to this series on the Korean War by writing Stalemate: U.S. Marines from Bunker Hill to the Hook, he took part in the Marines in World War II commemorative series, completing two pamphlets, Cape Gloucester: The Green Inferno and The Right to Fight: African-American Marines in World War II.
