Thugs hired by the wealthy merchants profiting from the slave trade, tried to destroy this man, but they couldn't break his devotion to Christ.In a time when most Pastors were afraid to speak out on slavery lest they lose their denominational credentials and salaries, Weld laid down his life, lost his health, and gave everything he had to preach the truth.
