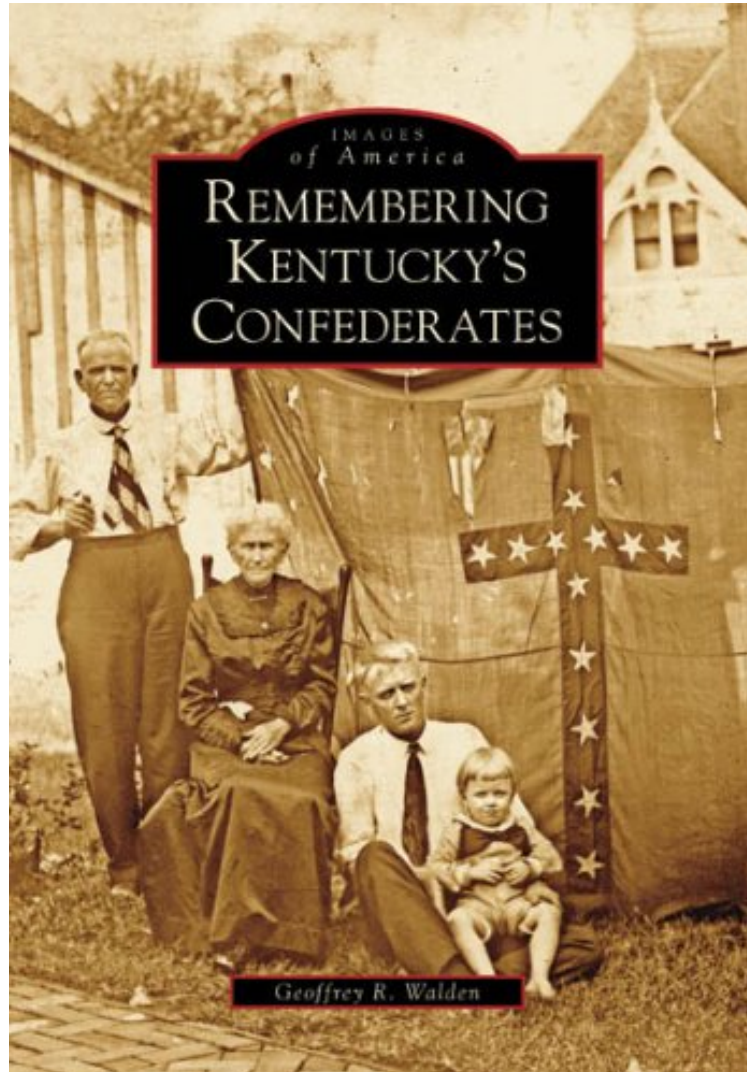

I bought this book because of an ancestor in the Orphan Brigade. This is a brief look at some of the history of the Kentucky Confederates but mostly a pictorial introduction to the subject with some excellent photos of the men who fought. It's not an extensive history, but I didn't expect that, so I wasn't disappointed. I think amateur

genealogists with family ties to the subject or just Civil War buffs will enjoy the book. However, as I stated, it's not extensive and is not a book of lists of names of men who fought for the Confederacy from Kentucky. I've found online resources for that. The picture quality is good and explanations of the uniforms are detailed. The pictures are of individuals (many officers), as well as some camp photos and some of veterans' gatherings after the war. For Kentuckians, the Civil War was truly a conflict of brother against brother. As a slave state bordering the United States and the Confederate States, Kentucky had ties to both the North and South. Although its state government remained in the Union, the people of Kentucky were divided in sentiment, prompting some 40,000 Kentuckians to leave their homes to fight for Southern independence. When Confederate soldiers eventually returned from the country's bloodiest war, they were held in high regard by their fellow Kentuckians. To be counted among the state's Confederate veterans was an honor, and when the number of living Confederate veterans began to dwindle, groups across Kentucky raised monuments to their memory. Remembering Kentucky's Confederates presents an overview of the state's Confederate soldiers and units who fought bravely in the War Between the States.
