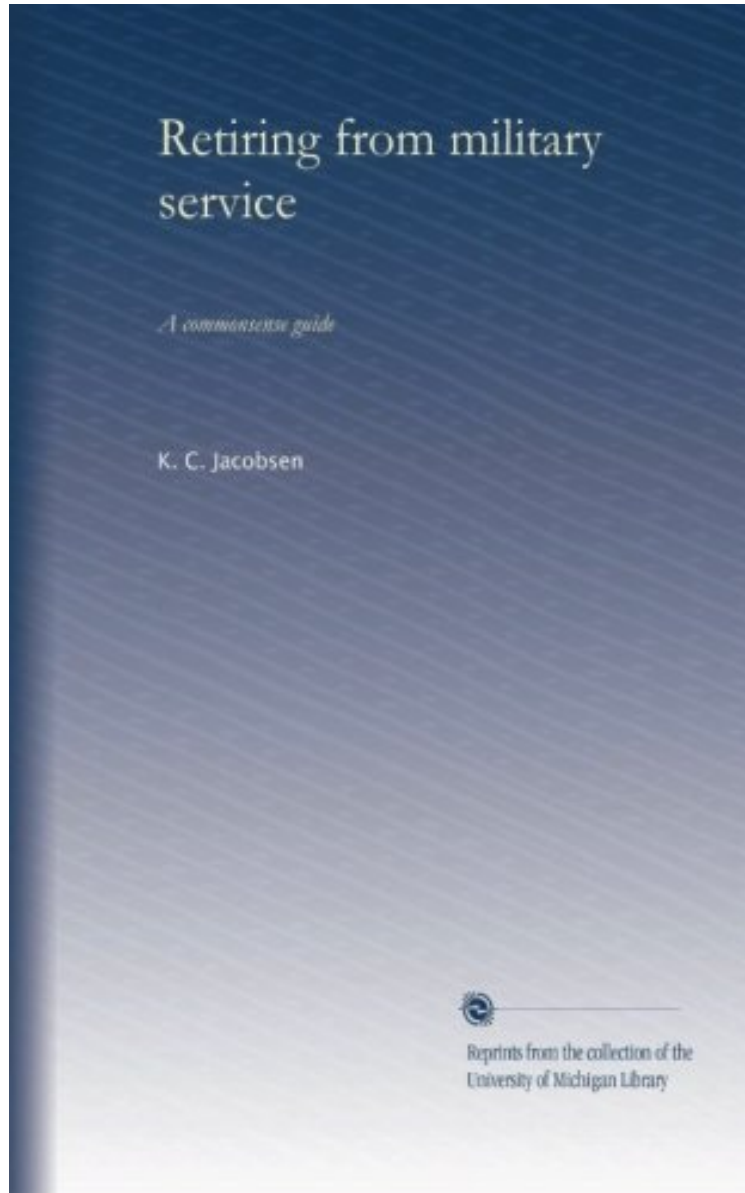

from military service and he was really glad he did. It told him everything he needed to know, in no-nonsense terms. First of all, the author encouraged those retiring from military service to be sure to have a retirement ceremony, because you would regret it later if you didn't; it would bring needed closure and would be something to look back on when you got over being bitter against the military upon leaving. He cautioned against leaving the military with a bad attitude and no ceremony, which would only invite the laughter and derision of the civilians on base. The author reminds retiring military personnel that in civilian life, there is nobody to pick you and your possessions up and deposit them in a new exotic location, but encourages us that civilians move, too, and in all probability, so would we (and we have!). The author warns that civilian life is different, without being too negative; he encourages retirees to look forward to civilian life again without making it seem like a cake-walk. The tone was just right. *Retiring From Military Service* told you how to conduct yourself on job interviews in the civilian world and especially warned of heeding the advice about job interviews in young women's magazines, which tends to be for those that needed to be told not to snap gum during the interview. His realistic assessment of civilian life is as follows: the fear of being stuck in one place all your life is superseded only by the fear that you can lose your job at any moment, and now you get to play, too! This ended up being prophetic in our lives, that's for sure. Every person retiring from military service definitely should read this book. My husband and I read it almost 20 years ago and have never forgotten it; rather, we benefited from it.
