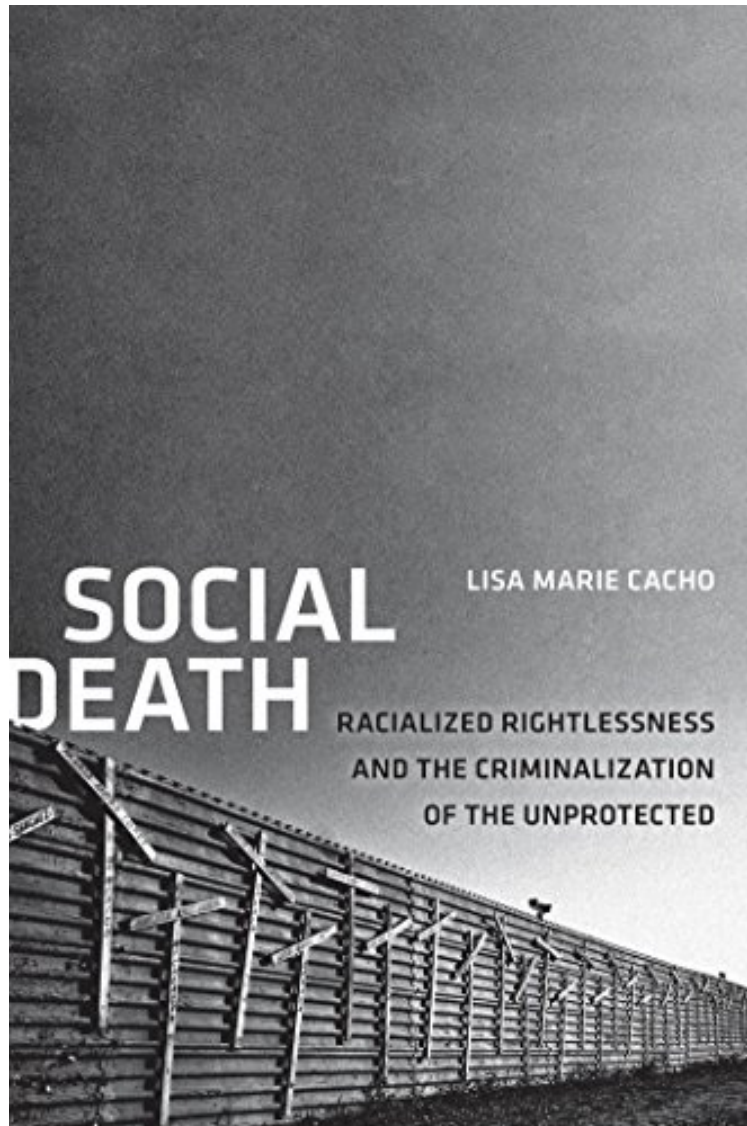

Using many vivid and unforgettable examples from all around us, Lisa Cacho demonstrates how certain people - undocumented immigrants, people suspected of being terrorists, poor racialized youth - are criminalized for their very status or state of being, viewed as a contagion, blamed for their vulnerability to exclusion and exploitation, without attention to their material histories, social relations, or structural conditions.
