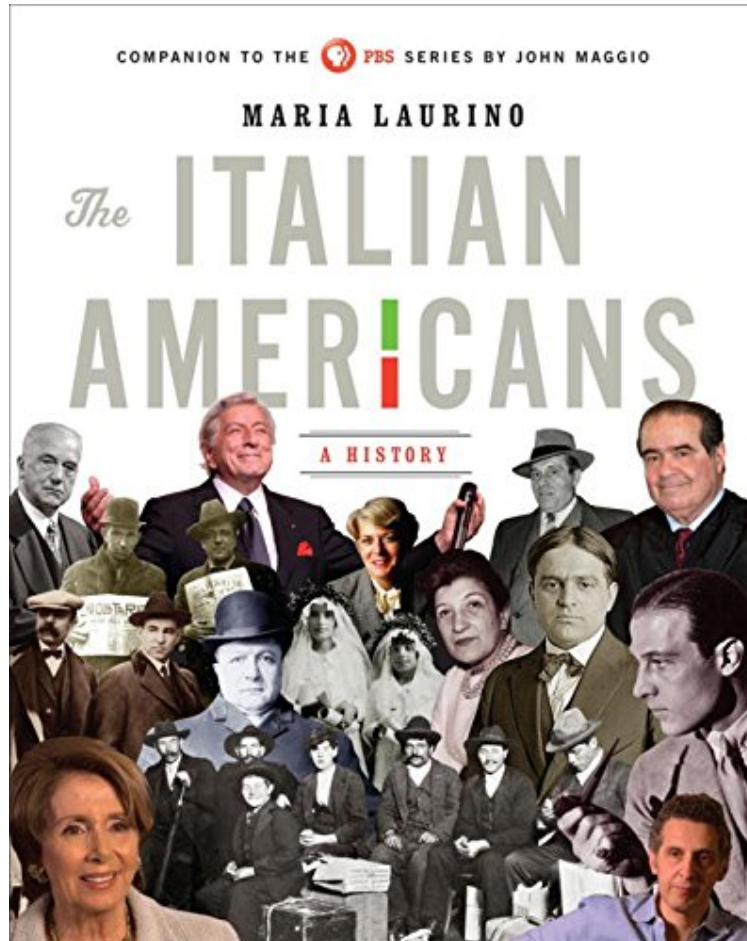

I should mention that I have read a lot of it and it does have a lot of information about some very famous and otherwise influential Italian-Americans spanning several different eras, not all of whom were part of "our thing".
